

Outdoor Learning





After a year and a half planning, training, volunteering and practicing, it was finally time for the Qualifying Expedition which would bring to an end the journey of Addington's first cohort of Bronze Duke of Edinburgh students. The sun shone on us for both days as we walked 14km from Cookham to Hurley and 13km from Hurley to Shiplake. The students had to be more independent than the practice expedition; they packed their rucksacks, navigated, set up/dismantled camp, cooked and helped each other get through the 2 days. They were assessed by a D of E assessor



over the 2 days and passed with flying colours! Having completed the physical, skills and volunteering sections, the expedition was the last piece of the jigsaw. All seven students have now officially passed their D of E bronze award.

A mix of Robin and Kestrel classes visited a strawberry, raspberry and blueberry farm in Charvil recently. The students enjoyed a tractor drive around the farm, learnt about tools, clothing and jobs on the farm. 




Sycamore and Maple class found some interesting water creatures including this dragonfly when they went pond dipping to Dinton **Pastures**

Local and national employers came to visit upper school students at Addington School. Students enjoyed learning about the different types of job roles in the retail industry, services and the tourist industry. Highlights of the day included bread-





making skills with Caterlink, and handling some really interesting artefacts from MERL museum. Students were also challenged to meet the high expectations of Marks and Spencers by folding jumpers to their standard nationwide level. Students who have a preference for outdoor learning enjoyed working with Ridgeline to pot and plant seeds for growing in the greenhouse.

Students have been developing their horticulture and landscaping skills at Loddon School. Having had time to develop their work based skills during winter months, the students have shown that they can independently follow instructions, work on less preferred tasks and use their own initiative to find jobs that need to be completed. They have also had the chance to develop their creativity skills by upcycling everyday materials into unusual plant

pots and selecting a range of plants for display.



Another creative venture was taking place for students at Reading University. Addington students have been working in the art department to

develop their film production techniques. Using self-made props,

students made a short film while also learning about

traditions - one of those being an afternoon cream tea. Before preparing their own cream tea,


students visited the Wyevale garden centre restaurant at Winnersh to find out how the tea is served and what makes afternoon tea so special.







As part of their investigations into Reading tourist attractions the students visited Reading museum to view the 'Bayeux Tapestry' replica. Some interesting photographs also emerged from the Ladybird Book display at the museum! Students also went for an exploratory walk around Reading to research local tourist attractions. They checked out Reading Museum and Reading



Abbey before walking by the river to find the new lido centre. After a picnic lunch in Forbury Gardens, students were ready to complete a traveler's guide to Reading town centre historical attractions.





Tourism investigations were completed by a tour of Dinton Pastures to find out about the standards of amenities at a country park. They investigated the café restaurant, the facilities, play



areas, picnic areas and the water sports provision.

Upper School students have been working throughout the year with Jan from the Newbury Agricultural society. She has cooked a range of seasonal recipes with us such as rhubarb muffins, apple crumble and vegetable soup. This term we met Jan at Cobb's at Engelfield – the farm shop where she sources all of her ingredients.

Jan provided a tour of the shop; students learned about the different groceries, the services provided by a farm the visit was completed with a butchery demonstration. Not for the faint-hearted!







Upper School students enjoyed a celebratory picnic in the sun before the beginning of the 'leavers' season. Each class made savoury and sweet foods; really delicious dishes that were thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. Some students also made their own picnic blankets as well as some fresh lemonade. They



invited school governors to join in, and it was lovely to be able to meet so many of the governors again before the end of term.







Students have been practising skills for leisure time, as well as enjoying leisure activities. This has included learning how to pack a suitcase, iron clothes and even putting up tents. We are definitely prepared for summer holidays!



Other classes in Upper School have been getting busy down on the farm. They had a fabulous day out at Hall Hunter partnership farm – they picked raspberries, taste tested blueberries raspberries and strawberries. Students learnt about PPE, health and safety and tools used in different jobs on farm. The highlight of the day was a ride on tractor to do a tour of the farm.





















Students learning to become more independent shoppers have been town training in and around Reading. Classes have been focusing on different types of cleaning products. They have been comparing prices, functions of cleaners as well as reading labels to try to become more knowledgeable about identifying dangerous chemicals, or COSSH, in the workplace.

As part of the 'I'm a Student...Get Me Out of Here' project students have also been developing their skills and knowledge around how to actually plan and pack for a holiday. They have visited a range of department stores in Reading to check out seasonal clothes and to compare prices in budget, mid-range and high-end stores. They have factored in sun-creams, luggage allowances and medical supplies into their holiday budgeting.

City and Guilds students have completed in the café and in the green-houses. Addington students and Bulmershe students have completed their City and Guilds Level 1 Diploma in Horticulture and in Hospitality. Internship students completed BTec level 1 award in Workskills,

and B-Tec level 1 in Hairdressing and Beauty Therapy. End of summer term in Upper School also comes with a series of endings and goodbyes. This term saw students come to the end of their successful internship at Sodexo (Johnson & Johnson) and National Grid. Two graduation ceremonies took place for recognition of student achievement.









In school, we had an afternoon tea party for students and employers to celebrate successes. Optalis Supported Employment Service joined us for the celebrations. We are delighted that three of our young people have secured paid employment following their experiences.

The year has finished in Upper School with the annual Leavers Assembly followed by Leavers Disco. It has been really sad saying goodbye to some people who have been in our lives for quite a long time. Families, friends and staff enjoyed Leavers telling them where they are going to next year; it was lovely to hear such a range of destinations, including Reading College, employment, Bracknell & Wokingham College, Newbury College and Foxes Academy. Good luck to all of our leavers!







2018 – 2019 Residential Trips

Residential trips are an integral part of our co-curricular activities at Addington. These outdoor educational trips afford our young people of varying abilities the opportunity to access adventurous activities and challenges, which give our students, not only enriching experiences, but the opportunity to grow in self-confidence; and develop their social and independence skills. With the view to providing our students similar experiences, irrespective of ability, we have organised three residential trips this academic year.

In May 2019 our Access class went to the Calvert Trust in Barnstaple, Exmoor where they experienced abseiling, archery, cycling, canoeing, crate stacking, horse riding, the giant swing and the zip wire. The evenings were more recreational, involving socialising and a disco.



Some of our Key Stage 5 students went to Grosvenor Hall in Kent, also in May this year for five days and four nights. They enjoyed a very full programme of outdoor challenges, involving climbing, problem solving and team building activities.



In June, thirteen Key Stage 4 students went on the annual New Futures residential trip to Tirabad, in Wales. This trip involves our students buddying-up with Sixth Form students from The Charters, Emmbrook and Maiden Erlegh schools. During the New Futures residential students do caving, gorge walking, canoeing and archery. They have the opportunity to develop their self-help and social skills.

Prior to these trips there is understandable trepidation all round, especially among parents of first timers. On our return it is clear that our young people have grown in self-confidence and independence.

None of these trips would be possible without the dedication of the staff who give up their time to accompany and support our young people. Key Stage 1 singing event




