

CAR PARKING REMINDER

- 1. All drivers <u>must</u> use the one-way system marked out by the cones and road markings
- 2. Only park in marked spaces and not on the end of rows
- 3. All pedestrians <u>must</u> use the zebra crossing and the pavement when walking children to and from the site. DO NOT WALK on the road by the side of the gates where there is <u>no pavement</u> as a short cut. This is very dangerous and could result in an accident



Bulmershe Access Road and Car Parking Improvements

During the summer holidays WBC completed Bulmershe access road improvements. During the planning and design process we asked WBC for other improvements, such as a pathway to be created through the hedging near the pedestrian crossing, as well as other safety issues such as speed restrictions and other signage. At the time they were not forthcoming, however, since the start of term we have again raised safety concerns with them particularly around the pedestrian crossing and the distance between the two speed humps which some drivers seem to ignore and still drive at speed.

WBC have taken these requests on board and are now planning some further improvement works which we hope will be installed very soon. In the meantime, we do ask that you are observant of the crossing and people waiting to cross. Unfortunately, they are not installing a pathway so please do not cut through the hedging.

WBC are also planning to enforce the no parking on yellow lines on the road and are currently undergoing a four-week consultation period. If this is all approved they will start ticketing vehicles queueing or parked on the yellow lines particularly in the afternoons as it causes congestion on Woodlands Avenue.

Future improvements have been approved and funded by WBC to create a new vehicle entrance from Woodlands Avenue, which it is hoped will further reduce congestion on the access road. The plan is also to carry out additional improvements within the car park for minibuses and taxis, which will hopefully improve the general flow of traffic at peak times. These works are programmed to be completed by the beginning of the summer term 2021



Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Qualifying Expedition 2019-2020



It has been a difficult year for our 2019-2020 Duke of Edinburgh students as they lost 6 months of practice and learning, had their volunteering, skills and physical elements interrupted and both the practice and the qualifying expeditions cancelled. All due to Covid-19!

However, when we came back to school in September, we put them through a crash course of tent building and revisited cooking and first aid. They were then ready for their qualifying expedition, which was hard as they hadn't had a practice one.

The expedition took place over the two days of 23rd and 24th September, slightly changed due to Covid-19 restrictions. The seven boys walked from Cookham to Hurley village (8.8 miles). We picked them up and brought them back to school where they put up tents on the school field and then cooked themselves a hot meal. They then went home as the restrictions say they cannot share a tent. It was just as well as it was a wet and windy night!

The next day they returned to school, made breakfast and took down their tents. Then they walked from Hurley Village to Shiplake railway station (8.6 miles), where the expedition finished and their Assessor passed them all!

All seven students have now officially passed their D of E bronze award. Well done everyone.







Early Years

Daisy Class



In Daisy Class most of our students have been getting used to being in school for the first time, as well as some settling back into the school routine and getting to know their new peers. We have been learning how to wash our hands with the baby shark song, to help us look after ourselves throughout the day. We have been looking at what our bodies can do, by taking part in wake up shake up, physio and movement songs. We have enjoyed the sensory stories 'Brown bear, brown bear what do you hear?', 'Polar bear, Polar bear what do you see?' and 'The Hungry Caterpillar'. Our highlight this term has been Rebound therapy sessions on the trampoline and hydrotherapy.







Sunflower Class



This term we have been settling back into school life. For some children this is the first time in a long while, and for others this is their first time at Addington School. We have loved going to all the different rooms around school, especially Splash! Our highlight of this term was role- playing we're going on a bear hunt', enjoying lots of sensory experiences as we walked through grass, mud, water and leaves and then walked down the corridor to the cave! The children loved being chased by the bear and it was lovely that everybody got so involved







Tulip Class



In Tulip Class, we have been learning to look after ourselves by washing our hands effectively, exploring healthy fruits and vegetables and learning to move and talk about our bodies. Our learning has been inspired by some fun books including 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar', 'Wash Wash Wash' and 'From Head to Toe'. In Maths, we have been learning to recognise numbers 1 to 5 and enjoying Waldon activities to help us engage with, explore and sort different objects. We have been exploring letters and sounds using a sensory approach to phonics teaching and some of us have begun reading symbol books. Very importantly, we have also spent lots of time trying new play activities and practising asking for the ones we already love!







Primrose Class



In Primrose class we have been using our hands, bodies and senses to explore new activities this half term. We have enjoyed getting stuck in with stirring, touching and tasting ingredients during our cooking sessions. We learned about different sounds and engaged in messy play as part of our sensory phonics lessons. We have copied actions with our bodies and had fun playing parachute games. We really enjoyed our music and yoga sessions and found the new toys during Bucket Time very interesting to look at!







Lily Class



Lily class have been working hard on their literacy skills so far this term. They have been doing regular phonics sessions, learning new sounds and carrying out lots of sensory and mark making activities. They have also been enjoying lots of books - particular favourites were 'Catch That Cough' by Bonnie Bridgman and 'The Smartest Giant in Town' by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler. These stories have linked well to the topic of 'Looking after myself' which has covered hand washing, germs and getting dressed.







Daffodil Class



This term in Daffodil Class our theme has been 'Looking after myself'. We spent lots of time learning to wash our hands independently, sometimes using a sequence strip to help us do it all in the right order. We enjoyed reading 'Catch that cough' to help us learn about 'catch it, bin it, kill it' and Snotty Paul and Snotty Sue helped us understand how to use a tissue. We have practised dressing and undressing for PE and Splash and we are learning how to sort our belongings to keep them safe and organised. We even had a shoes and sock race, some of us were very speedy! Our highlight of the week is Music and Movement with Claire and we love doing all the different themed Yoga poses. Everyone has been great at getting back into regular reading, phonics and maths sessions.

In Literacy, they have particularly enjoyed sharing two stories called Handa's Surprise and Oliver's Vegetables. In cooking, they have been making Salad Kebabs and learning how to follow a set of instructions. We have also learnt how to keep ourselves clean, practised washing our hands, brushing our teeth, and give a baby a bath!









This term Pine Class have been busy getting to know each other, building relationships and settling into our new environment. This term we have really enjoyed our cooking lessons where we have focused on making jam or chocolate spread sandwiches, recently we have incorporated cheese using a grater. Our focus has been to develop our independence, from gathering our own equipment to spreading the filling independently! This has been a great achievement for all! Another focus for Pine Class this term has been the importance of hand washing and keeping safe. The children have flourished in their ability to wash their hands independently and understand the importance of repeating this skill throughout the day!

Aspen Class Autumn News

During this half term Aspen class have been exploring the Seven Wonders of the Natural World as part of our topic "Magic and Mystery". From the heights of Mount Everest to the depths of the Grand Canyon we've been learning some phenomenal new facts about these wondrous places. We've also been cooking up some wonderful creations in the kitchen. Everyone particularly enjoyed the shortbread and the rolo tarts. In Maths we've learnt about capacity and practised telling the time. We've also been refreshing our knowledge of coins and money. During our visit to Camp Mohawk we had an enjoyable time exploring the outdoor environment with our friends.



Chestnut Class Autumn News

It has been a great first half term in Chestnut Class. We have welcomed 5 pupils brand new to Addington School and they are all settling in very ★well. The existing Addington pupils have been kind and welcoming. We are proud of all pupils. Our topic is Magic and Mystery. We have done some crazy experiments with coke and menthos, and with vinegar and bicarbonate of soda. The reactions caused much excitement. The pupils are really enjoying Literacy work based on Harry Potter. They have learned about the relationships between different characters and have designed their own quidditch type games. Each pupil is working on Maths tasks at their own ★level. The pupils have responded well to our Science lessons, we have learned about the Eatwell Plate and made our own plates of healthy foods from craft materials. We have investigated different types of rocks and fossils under a magnifying glass and carried out experiments on them. The pupils have made their own fossils from plaster of Paris.





In PHSE we have been learning that everyone is different and everyone is equal. We are learning tolerance, understanding and acceptance for each other's special needs. In social skills lessons we have been playing team games requiring co-operation with each other and the pupils are learning to describe themselves. We have a big focus on friendships and often play fun social games together such as Uno and Pop up Minion. We hope the pupils have a well-earned rest at half term.


Sycamore Class Autumn News







Science



In Apple and Lime classes our story has been "Dear Zoo". We have had lots of messy play and enjoyed swimming and rebound.



We learnt all about the jobs involved in looking after cats!










Work Experience on the 6th Form Reception!

We have a new and exciting 6^{th} Form building, so what better way than to be greeted at 6^{th} Form reception by the students themselves.






We have been working on a daily basis with the 6th Form students across each class to help them build on their office based work experience and communication skills.








From carrying out patrols of the building, to filling up photocopiers and sending emails, these are just a small number of tasks that the students have been responsible for.





Supported Internship Update

It is hard to believe that it has already been seven months since the start of Covid19 and the sudden halt of the EmployAbility Programme at National Grid. Even though we managed to complete the BTEC Work skills qualification remotely we felt that

the Interns' needs had not been fully met and that they needed a better 'ending' to their internship.

So together with Reading College we have been able to offer last year's Interns the opportunity to complete their Internship with two days' study at Reading College and two days remote learning doing a bespoke course for all students who have had their Internships affected. Our goal is to try and help them find paid employment just as we would have done towards the end of their time at National Grid. We are also preparing them for the new way of 'working from home' and using Microsoft Teams in our virtual lessons. Getting used to Internet glitches, connection problems and equipment that sometimes fails is all part and parcel of the new way of learning/working. We were hoping to be able to get back to the National Grid site from January, but with the rising number of cases and the advice to staff to carry on working from home, this is looking less likely. The emphasis is therefore to help the interns find employment or an apprenticeship which can use the great skills and knowledge they learnt during their time at National Grid.

It is a fairly similar situation at both Shute End and Sodexo where both offices are only open to business-critical staff and those who are unable to work from home. These businesses have now confirmed that this will be the case until at least March 2021.

The exception to this is Dinton Pastures Country Park. One of our students, whose internship



came to a sudden stop in March has been back at Dinton, initially as a volunteer through the summer but now 2 days a week alongside his course at Reading College to continue where he left off. He is very much part of the team again and is learning new skills, helping keep the parks neat and tidy, clearing leaves, putting up fences and anything else that is required. We are hopeful this will continue as it is outdoors and he is working in the same team each week.

The current situation has meant we have had to think creatively. For the first time we have set up an internal Supported Internship for a student who will be working with the Maintenance Team at Addington starting from week commencing 19th October. He will spend 2.5 days a week helping with all of the maintenance jobs that need to be done in a school. We are confident he will be a much-needed pair of hands for this team.

Eagle Class News - October 2020

While most of our curriculum has been onsite, the class has enjoyed a number of activities to help develop social and self-help skills, as well as developing skills



for the work place. We have continued to go shopping for ingredients to cook our lunch on Fridays. The class runs the 6th Form café once a week, which helps students to learn skills in hospitality. In Business Enterprise with Gail they have been making items to sell for Christmas. Some students have been doing Bike maintenance. This involves learning to look after and repair bicycles. Others are enjoying doing horticulture as an accreditation course. Our independent living space is used to help the young people to become more confident in life skills, by using a washing machine and tumble drier.



As part of internal work experience our young people are being given the opportunity to do supported work in the 6th Form Reception. This involves answering the phone, dealing with mail and manning the entrance to the 6th Form building.

The class has also enjoyed music sessions where they have been focussing on drumming during workshops.

The Links course at BCA, for students to have a taste of college life, has started. At the moment our class is doing land-based activities which involves looking after the

environment. In the Spring term, from February, they will be doing Animal care. In spite of everything, it has been a good, activity filled first half term.
